# 2024 President's Message Sebec Lake Association

I don't know about you but I am ecstatic over the arrival of Spring. It means being at the lake is just a few weeks away. I know many of you feel the same, as it has been a tough winter. 2024 is shaping up to be an important season on the lake, not just for the Association but for you as well. Why? Because we are intensifying our efforts to protect the lake.

As we've shared in past newsletters, the risk of invasive aquatic plants and animals is significant, and the threat moves closer to the lake each year. Adding to this threat is the increased runoff into the lake from the growing number of camps, from tended lawns close to shore, to old septic systems that are still in use. Top it off with higher summer temperatures and runoff caused by heavier rains and you have a growing storm threatening the lake we all enjoy. In response to these risks, the Association is scheduling 2 key events this summer.

The first event will be a presentation by the Soil and Water Conservation District for Piscataquis County on the **LakeSmart** program. This is an educational program about the risks of chemical runoff into the lake and how to minimize and mitigate it. This presentation is part of this year's <u>Annual meeting of the Association scheduled for July 13 at</u> <u>9:30 am, at the Central Hall in Dover Foxcroft</u>. You can learn more details about LakeSmart later in the newsletter.

The second event is a Plant Paddle. 'What is that?' you ask. A plant paddle is an on the water event. After a brief orientation on land, the group heads out on the water to observe aquatic plants, practice essential survey skills, and learn how to carefully collect plant samples for closer examination. Back on shore, basic aspects of plant structure are reviewed, plants the group has collected are identified, checking to see if any of the collected plants are suspected of being invasives. Our host for this event is Lake Stewards of Maine, a statewide lakes conservancy organization with expertise in aquatic plants. This is an empowering educational event, to show how simple

While we've grown our membership in the past few years, less than 30% of camp owners are members. If you are not a member, I urge you to be among the first new members of 2024 by filling out the form at the end of the Current.

In that regard, a big thank you to all of you who are members, some having been members from the very beginning, 52 years ago.

Finally, please support the local businesses that advertise in The Current and on our website. They also are vital to the health of the lake, the community, and thus to you.

# IFW Sebec Lake update 2024 Sebec Lake – Lake Trout evaluation report Tim Obrey

One of the earliest reports compiled by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife on the Sebec Lake fishery was authored by Carl Fenderson and published in 1955. The author had conducted a summer creel survey on the lake, primarily around the Earley's Falls area. At that time, the fishery was predominantly native landlocked salmon, but a few large lake trout were caught. This pre-dated any lake trout stocking program. The general consensus at the time was a few lake trout would drop down from upstream waters (Big Benson Pd, Big Greenwood Pd) and set up shop in Sebec Lake. There was no evidence that lake trout were spawning in Sebec Lake and few, if any, smaller lake trout were reported.

A lake trout stocking program was initiated in Sebec Lake in 1961, and soon after, the lake developed a reputation for producing some very large trophy lake trout. I've seen several pushing 25 lbs. The salmon population is still strong. Sebec has never been known for trophy salmon, but instead good numbers of smaller to medium sized fish. Our data indicate that hasn't changed. Up until the past few years, most of the lake trout caught on Sebec Lake originated from the stocking program but recently we've seen a higher percent of wild lake trout in the winter fishery, indicating spawning is now occurring in the lake.

We were collecting a sample of white perch for tissue analysis in the fall of 2022 and happened to see a large group of lake trout cruising over an area that is very typical of lake trout spawning habitat. We planned to return the next week with some nets, but the weather turned foul, and we lost our window of opportunity. Over the course of the winter, we made plans for a more comprehensive study on Sebec Lake. The Natural Resource Education Center at

Moosehead (NREC) purchased PIT (also known as RFID) tags and a special trapnet for us to use during this evaluation.

The trapnet stands six feet tall and is perfect for sampling lake trout on the spawning area. On Oct 13<sup>th</sup> 2023, I traveled down to Sebec Lake with our underwater drone to locate a netting site. On that trip, I saw several lake trout already milling around the site. We returned the following week with our gear, and we tended the nets every few days for the next four weeks. We implanted PIT tags into the left cheek of 59 lake trout that were all 18 inches or greater (legal size). The largest fish taken was 7 ½ lbs. We also recorded the length, weight, and the sex of the fish. We gave them a quick hole punch in the tail for identification before releasing them back to the lake. These PIT tags have individual codes, so if we encounter them at some point in the future, we will be able to determine how much they've grown since the time of tagging.

We plan to interview anglers this winter and perhaps next summer on the lake. We hope to see a few tagged fish in our routine census. We will have very good insights into the population and exploitation of lake trout in Sebec Lake based on the proportion of recaptures, the number of wild vs hatchery fish, and an estimate of total harvest. We'll see you on the lake!

I wanted to make sure all Sebec Lake residents know about the LakeSmart program - a service run by Maine Lakes and administered in Piscataquis County through PCSWCD - as this free program offers an easy way to play an active role in protecting water quality. It is essential that we are all working towards



protecting lake water quality, healthy lake ecosystems and doing what we can to prevent the invasion of invasive aquatic plants and the establishment of algal blooms. None of us want to lose native wildlife and fish populations, property value or not be able to enjoy recreational activities on the lake! Your connection to Sebec lake is important and the driving force behind efforts like LakeSmart. Like all lakes, Sebec Lake is susceptible to a range of pollutants, the most

common being soil erosion. The good news is, soil erosion can be easy to remedy through quick, low-cost fixes. That's what the LakeSmart program is all about - improving water quality with simple, mindful solutions!

How the LakeSmart program works: PCSWCD serves as a Maine Lake's LakeSmart HUB. Through this work, I provide free LakeSmart evaluations to all Piscataguis County waterfront property owners. Folks interested in an evaluation should first reach out to me, Kacey Weber, katherine.weber@piscataquisswcd.org, to set up an evaluation. The evaluations take between 30 minutes to 1 hour depending on the size of the property and whether or not the homeowner has guestions. Since the evaluations are completed outside of the camp/home, I can complete them with the homeowner present or not - whatever you are comfortable with! Either way, after the evaluation is completed, I provide homeowners with a full report of what was observed and resources to help back up any suggestions made in the report. I can provide recommendations on the construction of paths, roof drip line trenches, natural berms, native plants to use for buffers, restructuring and resurfacing driveways and even options for accessing the proper materials needed to make these improvements. Because one of the main goals of the LakeSmart program is educating homeowners, any suggestions made in the report are completely voluntary and are only meant to help steer folks to low-cost, easy fixes and to teach them how to identify, slow and stop issues occurring on their property that lead to issues in the lake.

Since starting this work in 2017, I have completed evaluations on Schoodic, Moosehead, Bennett Pond, the Wilson Ponds, Sebec River, Whetstone Pond, Piper Pond and Sebec. I have even had the chance to award several LakeSmart awards, including a few properties on Sebec! Yes - the LakeSmart program also serves as an award program, exemplifying properties that are lake-friendly!

## Lake Water Clarity and Quality

SLA has volunteers has volunteers who spend their time taking samples and readings relative to lake water quality and clarity. Water clarity is measured using a Secchi Disk. The Secchi disk (or Secchi disc) dates back to 1865. It is a plain white, circular disk 30 cm (12 in) in diameter used to measure water transparency or turbidity in bodies of water. The disc is mounted on a pole or line and lowered slowly down in the water. The depth at which the disk is no longer visible is taken as a measure of the transparency of the water. This measure is known as the Secchi depth and is related to water turbidity. Many elements can affect this measurement, including rainfall, watershed runoff, pollen, algae in as well as turbidity of the lake. For example, summer 2023 was influenced by frequent, and sometimes very heavy rainfall, a heavy pollen season and a greater number of year round homes on the lake that are landscaped nearly to the shore (fertilizer runoff).

On Sebec, clarity is measured at the same two locations on both the upper - large and lower - smaller water bodies. Measurements are taken at about the same time each day as the sun's angle can influence the ability to 'see' the disk in the water. Generally, readings are taken in the summer months, May through September.

# Sebec Lake Water Level, 2023 Data & chart provided by Mike McCormack

A couple of years ago, or maybe more, when a drought affected the summer plans of many, there was a lot of talk about the level of the lake. It was not a surprise that without rain the level of the lake was down. Way down. The question was: "How far down?"

Mike McCormack rose to the challenge and installed a ruler into the lake and aimed one of his web cams at it, then broadcast that information to the world through his website SebecLake.net.

Since that summer Mike has raised the level of accuracy significantly by constructing a higher resolution gauges. (see picture). As



can be seen in the chart below the accuracy is amazing. Each line is only 0.1 inch different than the next line. So while the graph may appear to take large swings, the lake level does not change much at all.

But in the end, at some point, there is always going to be a large rainfall or a drought.

# MAINE FOREST SERVICE NEW OPEN BURNING LAWS AS OF OCTOBER 25, 2023

Do you enjoy having recreational campfires at your residence, camp or vacation home? The most common cause of wildfires in Maine are fires that are too large or left unattended and escape. A new law has been enacted to reduce the chance of an escaped fire. It defines the size of a recreational campfire and the need for a burn permit for larger outdoor fires. The new law also makes it unlawful for burning outdoors during a red flag warning.

By definition, a "recreational campfire" means an outdoor fire that is used for cooking, personal warmth, light or ceremonial or aesthetic purposes and that is not a part of debris disposal (AKA burning brush). A residential fire contained within an outdoor fireplace also falls into this category.

#### ACCORDING TO SEC. 4. 12 MRSA §9324, SUB-§:

A person who kindles or uses a recreational campfire **may not** allow the recreational campfire to exceed 3 feet in diameter on the ground at the base of the fire or 3 feet in height. If the fire exceeds that size, then a burn permit is required. These burn permits can be obtained without cost at <u>www.maineburnpermit.com</u> or from your local fire dept.



The Community Wildfire Defense Grant program is now available to help communities reduce wildfire risk near homes.

# From the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife

New law impacting boaters, paddlers, anglers, and any other watercraft users.



To reduce the spread of aquatic invasive species in Maine, a law was passed by Maine Legislature that requires boaters to take specific actions to encourage water to drain from their watercraft prior to entering a water body or leaving a launch site (PUBLIC LAW 2023 CHAPTER 190). Aquatic invasive species are any fish, wildlife, or plant species that spreads to a water body where they do not naturally occur. These species are often transferred to new locations on watercraft, watercraft trailers, and other equipment associated with water recreation, and they impact the health of our waters, fish, and wildlife.

Effective June 16, 2023, boaters are now required to do the following:

Prior to entering a water body and when preparing to leave launch sites, boaters are required to remove or open any devices designed for routine removal/opening (for example, hull drain plugs,

bailers, live wells, ballast tanks) to encourage draining of areas containing water (excluding live bait containers). This must be done in a way that does not allow drained water to enter any inland water of the state.

This puts into law what the Clean, Drain, Dry educational and outreach campaign has already been encouraging boaters to do. By ensuring that all boaters are draining water when it is from a different source than the inland water body they are about to enter, the risk of spreading aquatic invasive species including some that are not always visible by eye, to new areas is drastically reduced. Similar laws are already in effect in more than 20 other states, including neighboring New Hampshire, Vermont, and New York. This law will limit the spread of aquatic invasive species we already have in Maine while proactively limiting potential for the introduction of aquatic invasive species that would be new to the state such as quagga mussels and the spiny water flea.
